Romanoff Family bequests Center for Russian Studies

NORMAN, Okla. — The Romanoff Center for Russian Studies has officially opened its doors thanks to a generous bequest of Princess Janet Romanoff of Russia. The estate gifted \$2 million to establish the Romanoff Center for Russian Studies and the Theodore N. Romanoff Professorship in Russian Studies is endowed in her late son's name. Included in the gift were items of significant historical, political and artistic value which established research opportunities and special collections.

The Romanoff Center for Russian Studies is dedicated to informing the University of Oklahoma community and the broader public about the history and culture of Russia, current events involving the Russian Federation, and Russia's actions on the world stage. The Center's mission is to promote the interdisciplinary study of the Russian Federation and its precursors, the Soviet Union and the Russian Empire. The Center hosts lectures, symposia, webinars and cultural events.

"We want to honor the intentions of the donor. Princess Janet Romanoff wanted to support the study of Russian culture and Russian history, so that's very important," said Dr. Melissa Stockdale, co-director of the Romanoff Center for Russian Studies.

Janet Schonwald married Prince Nikita Romanoff who was a descendant of the Russian Romanoff dynasty. Princess Janet was involved in many Russian-related philanthropic activities including the Russian Children's Welfare Society and the Russian Monuments and Culture Fund. Prince and Princess Romanoff also worked as informal cultural ambassadors to facilitate Russian and American relations.

"While the gift finally came through and the Center was created last year, my colleagues, Dr. Stockdale and Dr. Emily Johnson, have been working on these sorts of events for years. This is a pursuit of love in many ways, a passion of theirs," said Dr. Rebecca Cruise, Associate Dean of Student Services in the College of International and Area Studies.

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Princess Janet Romanoff and the Romanoff Family

Princess Janet Romanoff is a member of the Russian royal Romanoff family, who ruled Russia for over 300 years, from 1613 to 1917. The rule of the Romanoff dynasty ended in 1917 during the First World War, when Tsar Nicholas II was forced to renounce his throne due to an uprising.

The estate of Princess Romanoff gifted \$2 million to the University of Oklahoma to establish the Romanoff Center for Russian Studies. The gift also established the Theodore N. Romanoff Professorship in Russian Studies in her son's name. Princess Romanoff also chose to house important historical documents at the University of Oklahoma, including glass negatives of official Romanoff family photos, correspondence relating to the Romanoff family's emigration from Russia, and a bound volume of Grand Duchess Xenia's diaries from World War I and the revolutionary period.

Princess Janet Romanoff, formerly Janet Schonwald, was born in 1933 to Emanuel Schonwald and Ethel Diamond. Emanual Schonwald was an OU graduate who led a lucrative career in the oil industry. Princess Janet Romanoff went on to attend Barnard College where she graduated with a degree in Russian. She then attended Stanford University where she earned a PhD in Russian Literature in 1974.

During her time at Stanford, Princess Janet met Prince Nikita Romanoff, who was a graduate student in Russian history at the University of California at Berkeley. He completed an MA in Russian history and later taught history for a short time at San Francisco State University.

Prince Nikita Romanoff was born in England in 1923 to Prince Nikita Aleksandrovich Romanoff and Duchess Maria Illarionovna Vorontsova-Dashkova.Prince Nikita's father, grandmother and great-grandmother escaped from Russia in 1919 along with other family members.

Prince Nikita and Princess Janet Romanoff married in 1961 and had their only child, a son named Theodore, in 1974. Princess Janet spent most of her married life in New York

where she was actively involved in Russian-related philanthropic activities including the Russian Children's Welfare Society and the Russian Monuments and Culture Fund. Prince and Princess Romanoff also worked as informal cultural ambassadors to facilitate Russian and American relations.

Prince Theodore grew up to study classics and Egyptian and ancient languages at Columbia and Brown University. He eventually received an MA in Archaeology from Brown. Shortly after his father's death in 2007, Prince Theodore Romanoff passed away. As part of the Romanoff bequest, the Theodore N. Romanoff Professorship in Russian Studies is endowed in his name.

After the death of her husband and son, Princess Janet moved to Alexandria, Egypt where she continued her philanthropic work, with a particular interest in supporting the education of Egyptian women. Remembering her youth in Oklahoma with affection, and wanting to honor her son, Princess Janet Romanoff selected the university as the recipient of her legacy. She passed away in 2017.

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
